In the Hari-bhakti-vilāsa:

7.352-353 (Quoting from the *Skanda Purāṇa*) kiñca (It is also stated)

> śalagrāma śilā arccārtham pratyaham tulasī-kṣitau tulasīm ye vicinvanti dhanyāste karapallavā

samkrāntyādau nişiddho'pi tulasya vacayaḥ smṛtau param śrī viṣṇu bhaktaistu dvādaśyāmeva nepyate

The fingers of those who pick *tulasī* leaves from their garden every day for the worship of śālagrāma-śilā are certainly glorious. The earth where *tulasī* plants grow is also glorious. Although it is stated in the *smṛti* literature that one should not pick *tulasī* on the new moon day, full moon day, Dvādaśi, or Sunday -- the devotees of Lord Viṣṇu avoid picking *tulasī* leaves only on Dvādaśi.

7.354

atha tulasyavacaya niṣedhakālaḥ (Prohibitions for picking *tulasī*) viṣṇudharmmottare (In the *Viṣṇu-dharmottara* it is stated)

na chindyāt tulasīm viprā dvādaśyām vaisņavaḥ kvacit

O brāhmaņas, Vaisņavas should never pick tulasī on Dvādaśī.

7.355 gārude (In the *Garuda Purāna* it is stated)

> bhānuvāram vinā dūrvvām tulasīm dvādasim vinā jīvitasyā vināsāya na vicinvīta dharmmavit

A pious person who desires a long duration of life should not pick *tulasī* on Dvādaśī, and *durbā* grass on Sunday. If one does so, his duration of life will certainly diminish.

7.356

pādme ca śri kṛṣṇasatyā samvādīya-kārttikamāhātmye (In a conversation between Kṛṣṇa and Satyā that is found in the *Kārtika-māhātmya* section of the *Padma Purāṇa* it is stated)

> dvādaśyām tulasīpatram dhātrīpatranca kārttike lunāti sa naro gacchen nirayānati garhitān

A person who picks *tulasī* leaves on Dvādaśī and *dhātrī* leaves during the month of Kārttika will surely go to the darkest hell.
